



Inpatient Demographics for COVID-19 Positive Cases at Zuckerberg San Francisco General

- Case count 70 (as of 4/13)
 - 64%(45) male
 - Median age is 47 (90% are 36 86 y.o.)
 - 83% (58) Latinx/Hispanic
- Housing status
 - 40% (28) high density
 - 36% (25) multi-family

 Prototypical: middle age Latino man with diabetes, limited English, low-wage worker, dense living situation.

Mitigation Strategies

- Prevention: education, masks. Many still working
- Testing: improving. Still an issue
 - 415-682-1740 (Symptomatic patients without insurance or a doctor)
- Isolation and quarantine: offering hotels, capacity, work

Contact tracing: requires trust, tests, I+Q







Latinx Population and COVID-19 IN SCC






SCC Populations and 94 COVID-19 Deaths April 22, 2020

Impact on Service Delivery



- Moved primarily to telemedicine, seeing patients in clinic for injections and crisis assessment
- Working on developing best practices for engaging clients in phone/video services, lots of emerging creativity here!
- Building on resource lists daily as landscape is changing quickly



Challenges

- Engaging clients over the phone: younger clients (play therapy?), clients with psychosis/negative symptoms of Schizophrenia, working on building a safe "container" for therapy when there is a lot of fear, worry, history of trauma
- New requests for services has dropped significantly. *Why?* Fear of accessing services (SIP/Public Charge), lack of knowledge that services are still available, focusing on basic needs
- Access to information, technology, increasing inequity in academics with distance learning due to language and other barriers

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

WHAT WE ARE SEEING

- 60% increase in cases week one of shelter-inplace
- Decrease of about 10% compared to same time period in 2019
- Clients need shelter, food, money
- Increased isolation, stress about health, money, safety, work
- Those who speak other Latin dialects have limited information about what is going on with COVID-19

WHAT WE ARE DOING

- Raise awareness about the issue
- Partnerships with businesses

 - La Casa de las Madres

CHILD ABUSE

WHAT WE ARE SEEING

- 72% decrease in child abuse cases during shelter in place compared to same time period in 2019
- With schools closed, children have decreased interaction with mandated reporters
- Increased stress in homes can lead to increased or exacerbated abuse
- Parents have less support and resources during shelter-in-place

WHAT WE ARE DOING

Raise awareness about the issue

- Be Aware. Know what abuse is and how to help a child.
- Check on families with children to see if they need support and resources or someone to talk to. Develop a plan with a secret word in case they need to reach out to you.
- Help parents and children manage stress and anxiety. Offer to watch kids in-person or virtually if possible.
- Know the emergency services available in your community for children and families and how to refer them.
- If you think a child is experiencing physical, emotional, sexual abuse or exploitation report to child protective services at 800-856-5553 or call/text 9-1-1 if it is an emergency.
- Donate to organizations that provide support to children and families in San Francisco.





LEGAL PERSPECTIVE OF THE IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON THE LATINX COMMUNITY

Landscape of remote legal services & court hearings

Most Bay Area Legal Aide organizations have shifted to remote clinics, consults and full scope representations

- Court Closure Status Updates
 - Housing and Employment- Alameda Superior Court -opening up in a limited capacity on May 4th
 - New cases will not be dealt with until 90 days after shelter in place is lifted
 - Continuing cases will happen virtually; lawyers getting trained to represent clients in a virtual way
 - Jury Trials will not be done until July at the earliest
 - Affirmation Litigation- Federal courts have not closed so hearings will continue
 - Immigration- Detention, Master Calendar and SIJS hearings have been virtual. SF court will reopen May 15th

LEGAL PERSPECTIVE OF THE IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON THE LATINX COMMUNITY

Collaborative advocacy and resources to address the current COVID-19 crisis

- Eviction moratoria in multiple jurisdictions (City of Alameda, City of Oakland, City of Hayward, Alameda County)
- Emergency Financial Assistance for tenants and homeowners facing eviction (City of Alameda, City of Oakland, Alameda County, City of Berkeley)
- Oakland Undocumented Fund Local worker relief fund; Statewide coalition and Governor Newsom \$125M Fund
- Comprehensive workers guide to explain legal protections of workers new local, state and federal protections
- Immigrant detainee release efforts for medically vulnerable and reentry planning (ICE Detention Facilities; Santa Rita)
 - Decision, requiring ICE to review for release every person -- nationwide -- with COVID-19 risk factors: <u>https://creeclaw.org/in-victory-for-detained-immigrants-federal-judge-orders-ice-to-review-for-releaseevery-person-with-covid-19-risk-factors/</u>.

LEGAL PERSPECTIVE OF THE IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON THE LATINX COMMUNITY

Long term legal strategies post COVID-19

- Economic recovery through rent forgiveness for low income tenants and homeowners
- Safety Net for All benefit programs available for those excluded from UI because of immigration status
 - I00+ Organizations Call on Governor Newsom to Protect Undocumented Workers Affected by the Covid-19 Outbreak <u>https://legalaidatwork.org/blog/undocumented-workers-and-covid-19/</u>
- Immigration:
 - Build a legal services response that prioritizes release now of those most at risk, but also longer term strategies for decarceration including coordination and resource development for non-legal organizations (e.g., working with community groups and legal orgs to identify most vulnerable at Mesa Verde and Yuba)
 - Expanding pro se assistance to empower community
 - Supreme Court decision related to DACA- coordinate a legal services response to protect all DACAMENTED, especially those who have prior removal orders
